

Rabbi's Message Questions at the Seder... and Beyond

Jews love to ask questions. We take great pride in the "nothing is off limits" aspect of our culture and religion. Children are trained from a young age to be curious and inquisitive, perhaps even slightly irreverent.

This month, we celebrate the holiday that places the asking of questions at center stage. Mah Nishtanah - Why is this night different - is the most well-known passage in the haggadah, and the first part of the seder that children learn. But the mitzvah of asking does not end with the ritual singing of the Four Questions. In fact, it is not even necessary to recite those specific questions. The Talmud records a story about one seder that the sage Abbaye spent with Rabbah. When Abaye saw that the tables were being cleared away before they had even begun the meal, he turned to his friend and inquired: "We still haven't eaten, why are they taking the tables away?" Rabbah responded: "You have [just] exempted us from reciting Mah Nishtanah." (BT Pesachim 115b) Any sincere inquiry about the rituals performed at the seder fulfills the mitzvah of asking questions. And the obligation to ask questions is not just for children. Adults, in the absence of children, must recite Mah Nishtanah as well.

The reason that questions play such a central role in the *seder* is rooted in our most ancient sources. The Torah refers on three occasions

to children asking their parents about the meaning of ritual practices performed during Passover. Parents are to answer their children's inquiries "On that day you shall tell your child..." - proceeding to describe, in the first person, how God redeemed "us" from slavery in Egypt. These three questions and answers, along with a fourth parental answer that is not prompted by a question, are the basis of another beloved part of the seder. The Four Children emphasize our duty to respond to the curiosity of every child, even the one who is not able to verbalize his or her thoughts.

There is an important pedagogical lesson here. Symbolic rituals performed in the home create opportunities for parents to teach their children about the foundational stories of Judaism: in this case, the Exodus from Egypt. It is not difficult to conduct a *seder* in which questioning is central. Think of the many symbolically rich elements: special foods, hiding the afikomen, singing special songs, four cups of wine, and the list goes on. Even the most bare-bones *seder* is filled with opportunities to spark our curiosity.

This lesson should not be one that we restrict to Passover. In twenty-first century America, the two days of the seder are not enough. If we want to instill a religiously inquisitive spirit in the next generation, we have to go out of our way to spark our kids' curiosity. Find a great Jewish book and bring it home. Try out a recipe from a Jewish community other than your own. Print out an article from the web to discuss during dinner on Friday night. Invite your child to light his or her own Shabbat candles. Anything we can introduce into our homes to make Jewish living interesting and new will convey the message that being Jewish is important to us. And, it might get our kids asking questions: questions about Jewish values, his-

tory, ritual, culture, and even God.

While coming to synagogue and learning in religious school or Jewish Day School are important, there is no more powerful way to instill children with a love of Judaism than to surround them with viddishkeit where they are most comfortable – at home. The wisdom of the seder is that it takes place not in the sanctuary but around the dining table.

This Passover, let us find ways to prompt new questions. As the holiday ends, may the spirit of questioning that we create during our seder remain in our homes to infuse our lives with curiosity and love of Judaism throughout the year.

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President's Message Seder Memories

As we approach the month of April, Passover comes to mind. For me. Passhas always meant family, food and friends. I have many fond memories of Passover Seders that were filled with discussion, conversa-

tion and good food. Although a week without bread and similar fare is difficult for me, I know that the importance of understanding who we are and where we come from is crucial.

One of my most memorable Seders as a child took place at the home of one of my family's good friends. At the time, the Seder seemed to go on forever, but in retrospect, it was probably not that long. It is one of the few times in my life that I ever did the full Hebrew reading of the Hagaddah. Along the way, I learned a lot a lot about Passover and the struggle for freedom. Until that night, Passover always seemed like the movie, The Ten Commandments. I learned that night that it was something more.

I also learned a valuable lesson about cooking. One of the guests had cooked a Passover honey cake using the synagogue's recipe book. We all took a bite and almost choked. It was crunchy. The baker said "it called for a cup of tea". We found out that she had opened enough tea bags to get a

cup of leaves and added those to the batter. One of the other guests said "I know that recipe, it is a cup of brewed tea, not tea leaves". To this day, I always look at my honey cake twice.

The second Passover meal I remember was when my parents invited 35 people to our house. There were three tables that stretched from the dining room, through the front hall and into the living room. My mom cooked a spectacular meal. While the Seder was abbreviated, the scene was boisterous and everyone left with a warm feeling of being part of a community.

Last year, as we were thinking about where to seat people for our Seder, we realized that we had overcommitted our space. So we opted for a middle eastern style Passover. We cleared out the playroom, put pillows on the floor, jamnmed those who could not sit on the floor so easily onto the sofa, and literally reclined for our Seder. Our Seder was filled with fun conversations and singing. While there were grape juice spills and lots of matzah to vacuum up afterwards, it was well worth it to see everyone being part of something larger. It was also a way to involve people who were not part of our community into our celebration. We always try to open our home to people who do not have a place to go for Passover, a lesson I learned from my family. We have met lots of great people along the way.

Staff from Congregation Sinai, APJCC in Los Gatos, South Peninsula Hebrew Day School and Shir Hadash had a wonderful staff development day on March 7th. We were involved in Torah learning with Rabbi Melanie Aron from Shir Hadash about the importance of listening in Jewish tradition. Our featured speaker was Alise Shafer, the founder and director of the Evergreen Community School in Santa Monica. She talked about listening to children from a Jewish perspective based on her background and rich experience. We also had the opportunity to interact and share with teachers from the other schools. At the last minute we found out that the Silicon Valley Jewish Federation had a fund to sponsor the day, and we are very grateful to them.

"Mishenichnas Adar marbim b'simcha" - when Adar comes we rejoice.

Purim is one of the children's favorite Jewish holidays. They get to

dress up in costumes and march in a parade, make a lot of noise (with the graggers), bake and eat sweet pastries like hamantashen, and participate in a fabulous Purim carnival. The story in the megillah is filled with interesting characters that the children can identify with and relate to. After the costume parade at school, the children enjoyed special games, but their favorite activity was face painting.

The Challah Club (afternoon program) had a great time learning about fire safety. We decided to introduce the children to fire safety when one child noticed a man inspecting the fire alarms at the synagogue. We took a tour of the building and noticed all the alarms and fire extinguishers. We learned about Stop, Drop and Roll, practiced evacuating the school, and learned how to prevent forest fires. The highlight of the week was when Daniel and Allyson Moskowitz (and Smokey the stuffed bear) came in their fire fighter gear and talked about fire safety and gave out stickers!

The month of April is about learning and preparing for Pesach. We read about the Jewish people being slaves in Egypt, and how Moses, with the help of his siblings and under God's guidance, got them out. From slavery to freedom is the essence of the story that is written in the Hagaddah. We have already started cleaning our classrooms to prepare the school for our model Seder on Friday, April 15th. We will be telling the story of Pesach, acting out portions of it, talking about the symbols, singing special songs (especially the Mah Nishtanah), and enjoying the lunch prepared by the children that includes typical Pesach dishes.

Pesach in the Sinai Religious School

I would like to share with you our upcoming Pesach programs in our Religious School. We will be having two school-wide programs to get ready for the holiday. One will be an Exodus Simulation, designed to give students an opportunity to experience the story of our exodus from slavery. The other program will teach students about the mitzvah of bedikat chametz – the search for chametz.

Our Exodus Simulation will take place during Religious School on Sunday, April 10. There will be five stations representing different parts of the Exodus story. Students will visit each station as a class. The stations will be lead by 7th grade students, who will be dressed as Egyptian task-masters and Israelites, parents, and Rabbi Berkenwald.

At the first station, students will carry "bricks" back and forth to recreate the Israelites' experience of slavery in Egypt. Next, students will meet, Moses, played by Rabbi Berkenwald, who will inform them of God's plan to free them from slavery. At the third station, students will make paintings with red paint and put them on the doorpost to avoid being stricken by the Tenth Plague. Next, students will prepare for their journey by making matzah. At our final station, students will cross the "Red Sea" and celebrate their freedom with singing and dancing to mi chamocha.

Our Bedikat Chametz program will take place on Sunday April 17. Students will search the shul for bread crumbs using feathers and flashlights. Then they will learn the appropriate brachot for Bedikat Chametz with Rabbi Berkenwald. Each student will decorate a dust pan that has the brachot on it so they can use it at home for their family's bedikat chametz ceremony.

I look forward to seeing all of you at shul during Pesach!

PESACH GUIDE 2011/5771

This document is based on a guide prepared by the Kashrut Subcommittee of the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards. For more information, please consult Rabbi Berkenwald.

This guide provides information about purchasing and using food and ingredients for Pesach. Changes in food production, as well as new kitchen appliance technologies result in yearly changes to our Pesach guide. For a complete guide to kashering your kitchen, along with more extensive information about food during Pesach, come to the Sinai office or visit the Sinai website. As always, Rabbi Berkenwald is available to answer questions that arise.

SALE OF CHAMETZ - MEKHIRAT CHAMETZ

Because the Torah prohibits the ownership of *chametz* during Pesach, one should dispose of all food products that contain *chametz*. If doing so would result in significant financial loss, one may sell one's *chametz* to a non-Jew. The transfer, *mekhirat chametz*, is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted *chametz*. If ownership of the *chametz* was not transferred before the holiday, the use of this *chametz* remains prohibited after the holiday – and any such products should be given away to a non-Jewish food pantry.

GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS

Because the Torah prohibits the eating of *chametz* during Pesach, and because many common foods contain some admixture of *chametz*, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesach. During the eight days of Pesach, the minutest amount of *chametz* renders the whole admixture *chametz*, and its use on Pesach is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, *chametz* follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e., it loses its identity in an admixture of one part *chametz* and sixty parts of non-*chametz* (*batel b'shishim*). This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesach. For example, milk rarely, if ever, contains *chametz* and thus may be bought before Pesach without special certification.

Kasher l'Pesach labels that do not bear a recognized symbol of rabbinic supervision or the name of a living rabbi, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting your rabbi. Following are the generally accepted principles of kashrut for Pesach according to Ashkenazic practices (except where noted). If you have any doubts or questions, or want to know where you can find kasher l'Pesach foods, please contact Rabbi Berkenwald.

PROHIBITED FOODS

- **A.** Chametz Any food, liquid, alcohol, or food derivative made from the five grains (wheat, barley, oats, spelt, and rye) without a *kasher l'Pesach* label. This includes, but is not limited to: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, etc.
- **B. Kitniyot** Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (*kitniyot*) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas). These and other plant foods (e.g. mustard, buckwheat, sesame seeds, etc.) are not permitted on Pesach. String beans, however, are permitted. Although many rabbinic authorities have prohibited the use of peanuts and peanut oil, our Movement's Committee on Laws and Standards has permitted their use and consumption on Pesah provided said items have proper kosher certification and no obvious *chametz*. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state. Examples include: corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Because Israeli products are often marked "contains kitniyot," Ashkenazi Jews should be vigilant when purchasing Israeli products.

PERMITTED FOODS

A. The following foods do not require a kasher l'Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach:

Fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes see above); eggs; fresh or frozen whole or gutted fish; fresh or frozen kosher meat other than chopped meat, raw nuts in their shell; bottled water.

B. The following foods do not require a *kasher l'Pesach* label if purchased <u>prior to Pesach</u>, but do require a *kasher l'Pesach* label if purchased <u>during</u> Pesach:

Milk; Lactaid milk; white granulated sugar; unopened packages or containers of ground and whole bean regular unflavored coffee (however, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); pure unflavored tea (not herbal tea); noniodized salt; pepper; extra virgin olive oil; pure orange juice or frozen juice concentrate with no additives; Realime and Realemon reconstituted juice; frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda; raw shelled nuts that do not list BHA or BHT in the ingredients; raisins; quinoa; filleted fish; frozen raw fish that contains no ingredient other than fish; canned tuna packed in water only; Hershey's Chocolate Cocoa Powder.

C. The following foods require a *kasher l'Pesach* label if purchased <u>before or during Pesach</u>:

All baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); wine; cheese, butter, yogurt, sour cream, cottage cheese, and all other dairy products; canned or bottled fruit juices (these juices are often clarified with *kitniyot* which are *not* listed among the ingredients); dried fruits; decaffeinated coffee; decaffeinated tea; flavored and herbal teas; frozen vegetables; frozen processed foods; all ground spices and spice blends; canned tuna packed in anything other than water (broth, oil, etc.); vinegar; liquor; oils; dried fruits; candy; chocolate flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt and soda.

CLEANING PRODUCTS

Any detergents, cleaners, etc. which are not foodstuffs and which are not eaten, may be used for Pesach and do not require a *kasher le-Pesach* label. These items include: isopropyl alcohol, aluminum products, ammonia, coffee filters, baby oil, powder and ointment, bleach, charcoal, candles, contact paper, plastic cutlery, laundry and dish detergent, fabric softener, oven cleaner, paper bags, plates, wax paper, plastic wrap, polish, sanitizers, scouring pads, stain remover, and bottled water with no additives.

MEDICINE Before discontinuing any medication, consult with your physician.

- A. All pill medications (with or without *chametz* binders) that one swallows are permitted without special rabbinic certification as being kosher for Passover.
- B. All chewable pills that have kitniyot are permitted. If the chewable pills contain *chametz* and no substitute is available, ask your rabbi.
- C. All liquid medications that have *chametz* should not be used. If they contain no *chametz* but do contain *kitnivot*, they are permissible.

COSMETICS AND TOILETRIES

- A. All varieties of body soaps, shampoos, stick deodorants, ointments, creams, nail polish, hand lotions, eye shadow, eyeliner, mascara, blush, foot and face powders, and ink and paint are permitted for use on Pesach regardless of their ingredients.
- B. Colognes, perfumes, hairspray, shaving lotions, and deodorants that have restorable, denatured alcohol should not be used. This applies only to products in a pure liquid state.

C. Lipstick that contains *chametz* should not be used.

Authorization to Sell Chametz

Nisan 5771 - April 2011

The Torah prohibits the ownership of *chametz* (leavened grain) during Pesach (Passover). If possible, all *chametz* – food not acceptable during Pesach, or materials containing such unacceptable food – should be destroyed or given away before the holiday begins. Should this be impossible, the *chametz* may be stored in such a way that one is sure to not use it during the holiday. Its actual ownership is transferred to a non-Jew until the holiday ends.

The transfer, *mekhirat hametz*, is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted *chametz*. If ownership of the *chametz* was not transferred before the holiday, the use of this *chametz* is prohibited after the holiday as well.

It is appropriate to make a gift of tzedakah when appointing an agent for the sale of chametz.


