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### Rabbi's Message

I sit at a picnic table outside of

Binyan Bet (Building B), listening to the sounds of the first day of second session at Camp Ramah in Ojai, California. Birds are chirping to one another. Counselors walk by hurriedly as they plan

for their campers' first day activities. The air is pierced by occasional sounds of singing or excited screaming from campers who are reuniting with friends from previous summers.

Reflecting on the specialness of this place, it occurs to me that Ramah uniquely brings together campers, teen-age counselors-in-training, college students, Rabbis, teachers, professors, dancers, Israelis, and others. All of us are here to have transformative experiences.

Before the campers arrive, I attend shacharit (morning) services with the hundred or so staff members who are getting ready to welcome their new campers. There is something very special about praying at Camp Ramah. The room is filled with young Jews wearing *tallit* and *tefillin*, singing enthusiastically to prayers that they know well. The Ramah synagogue, Beit K'nesset Ramah, is located at the center of camp, nestled in hills of Ojai that are reminiscent of Israel. This is a place where Jewish prayer can be transformative. We recite the morning blessings, praising God with the words oter visrael b'tifarah - who crowns Israel with glory. I think to myself, "this is surely a place for experiencing God's glory."

I meet up with the Sinai kids who have just arrived for second session. Their emotions are a blend of sadness after saying goodbye to parents, exhilaration at the thought of being on their own, and anticipation for the countless exciting activities that they will experience over the next four weeks. They will sing, swim, act, play sports like basketball, tennis, and flag football, surf, do social action projects, learn Hebrew, and more - all in an environment in which Judaism is the norm twenty-four hours

Camp Ramah is important not only for the experiences that it offers kids, but also for the Jewish leadership training that it offers to their counselors. Not only are campers' experiences infused with Jewish learning, the staff also spend time exploring their own Jewish identities. Later tonight, I will lead a "Schmooze with the Rabbi" session for some of the *mumchim*, specialists - the lifeguards, sports instructors, art teachers, drama coaches... Many of the rabbis, cantors, and teachers of the Conservative movement were inspired by their time at Ramah. It is a training ground for the future leaders of the Jewish community. I believe I became a rabbi due, at least in part, to the leadership experiences that I gained during the three summers that I was a *madrich* (counselor) at Camp Ramah. That is why it is such a great privilege for me to be able to visit in the summer with my family.

I am proud and excited that parents in our community have chosen to send approximately fifteen kids to be campers and counselors at Camp Ramah this summer. Whatever they do in their lives. I hope that their experiences will be as transformative as mine have been and continue to be.

best childhood friends are going to be in town visiting with their kids from Seattle and Los Angeles. Our Fourth Musketeer lives in Oakland. The sight of my boys along with the children of my friends, around the kitchen table that we sat at as teens, is really enjoyable. We try to get our kids together once a year and, while they are all very different, they get along pretty well. So, how does this relate to summer? While I met these friends at a Kadima event in 6th grade, what solidified our relationship is that we all went to Camp Arazim (Northern California's now defunct Conservative Jewish summer camp) together for many years. Even though we have all taken different paths and don't see each other often, these are my lifelong friends whom I have always been able to count on and with whom I have shared all sorts of life events, both happy and sad. I believe the experience we shared in Jewish youth group and at Jewish camp nourished the relationship we still share today. I also believe these experiences have led me to a successful career in sales and helped create my foundation as a committed Jewish adult.

Now to the next generation. Three of the families of the Musketeers are packing their kids' trunks. ready to send their kids to a Jewish summer camp. My children will be going to Camp Ramah in Ojai while my friend from Seattle sends his kids to a Solomon Schechter camp in Washington State. One of our other friend's daughters go to a Modern Orthodox camp in Ohio. The children in these same three families have children that are involved in Jewish youth groups. As you know, it is not always easy to get kids to pack their bags and leave home for a month, or to attend a function with kids older than they are with whom they do not have close relationships, but I really believe that attending camp and youth group makes a difference.

In our busy lives, it can take an effort to convince your child to try something new and outside of their comfort zone, and it can take effort on your part to get them to their destination amidst competing activities. But, I encourage you to give it a try.

Having friends in a different context than school or sports can be a relief for many kids and allow them to show themselves in a different light. It also allows them to meet other kids that they might not otherwise have a chance to meet and broaden their social horizons. And, who knows, some thirty years later, they may be sitting around the kitchen table with their kids and the kids of their camp friends, showing how silly they looked in their camp photos from long ago and leading our next generation of community volunteers as committed Jewish adults.

As you continue to enjoy the summer and watch your children and grandchildren grow and mature, consider the foundation that you are providing for them and what role a Jewish summer camp and vouth group may play in their development as people and as Jews. At Sinai, we have Jr. Kadima for children in 5th and 6th grade led by Rozita Tabibian, Kadima for 7th and 8th grade children led by our Youth Education Director, Kate Mueller, and USY for 9th -12th graders. We are in the process of interviewing several candidates to take over USY after Debbie Lewis' retirement to raise her son, Jaren.

So, encourage your kids to attend an event this fall. Who knows whom they will meet.

### **Religious School**

This past June, I had the opportunity to participate in the New Director's Institute, a conference for new directors of Conservative religious schools. The conference was held outside of Baltimore, Maryland. I initially hoped to do a lot of networking with the new crop of Conservative religious school directors, learn how they deal with the common issues facing religious school education, and trade ideas for programs. I did not anticipate the most interesting aspect of the conference.

As I spoke with the other directors, I learned that most schools (day school & religious school) use a curriculum theory called Understanding by Design (UBD). This theory was written by Grant Wiggins from the secular education world. Understanding by Design is a "backwards approach" because it starts with the desired learning outcomes and then works out the learning activities, assessment tools and materials to

achieve them. I decided to research this curriculum, find out why everyone uses it, and consider whether it would be worthwhile to apply it to the Sinai curriculum.

I found it to be very organized when it comes to learning outcomes. It divides the objectives into what the students will understand, know and be able to do. There are six ways to understand something according to Wiggins: interpret, empathize, explain, apply, gain perspective, and acquire knowledge of facts. This curriculum theory involves identifying essential questions that will provoke meaningful and challenging questions in the classroom. Another interesting aspect of this theory is that it makes students aware of the goals of each lesson from the beginning.

I felt inspired to apply UBD to our current religious school curriculum. I wanted to start with a project that was accomplishable within the amount of time before religious school begins. I have begun applying UBD to the chagim (holidays) curriculum for the entire school.

UBD will benefit our school because it will help us address the age-old issue of religious school not being sufficiently challenging for students as well as being repetitive. It challenges us to look deeper at our learning objectives and to consider what the students will be able to interpret and explain, what facts they will know, how they will be able to apply the lessons to their lives, etc...

I am very excited to be able to engage our children in Jewish learning in a deeper and more comprehensive way. If you are interested in more information about this curriculum theory and how we are applying it to our school, please feel free to come to the religious school office to take a peek at how it's developing.

### Congregation Sinai's New B'nei Mitzvah Program

A child's becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah is one of a family's signature Jewish moments, and is one of the most significant moments in a Jewish child's life. It is an opportunity to demonstrate the knowledge that a child has gained through formal education as well as the beginning of new personal and communal Jewish responsibilities.

To meet the needs of our growing community, the Board of Directors of Congregation Sinai approved a major revision of the B'nei Mitzvah program. This new, comprehensive program is designed to accomplish several goals:

- comprehensively prepare all children in our congregation for their B'nei Mitzvah,
- instill a sense of Jewish identity and personal connection with the Sinai community that will last a lifetime,
- provide B'nei Mitzvah families with a meaningful Jewish experience that inspires growth and learning.

Achieving these ambitious goals requires engaging the children in our community in diverse contexts over many years. Much thought and planning has gone into developing a program that expresses the ideals of the Sinai community. Please keep in mind that the Sinai B'nei Mitzvah program is designed for everyone in the congregation. It is expected that every student will remain enrolled in the Sinai Religious School or a Jewish Day School through seventh grade.

The B'nei Mitzvah program is designed both to teach Jewish children how to participate in Jewish worship as well as to be future leaders in the Jewish community and in the world. It has been designed to meet the needs of the families of Congregation Sinai and reflect the values of the community. Here are some aspects of the new program towards which to look forward:

- To help students develop confidence and mastery of the Shabbat morning service, children will be given many opportunities to lead prayers during youth programs and in the main sanctuary. A comprehensive list of objectives will enable teachers to support each child's individual progress beginning in 3rd grade.
- B'nei Mitzvah families will meet in 5th grade for the first of several family education sessions with the Rabbi, as well as to select B'nei Mitzvah dates.
- During sixth grade, all students attending Sinai Religious School or a Jewish Yavneh Day School will spend one hour on Sunday mornings from 9:00 am to 10:00 am learning to lead prayers from the Shabbat morning service, as well as to chant Haftarah.
- During seventh grade, all students will meet weekly on Sunday mornings through December. Students will explore real-world Jewish ethics, and will develop family mitzvah projects, to be performed monthly by the entire class during the Spring.
- Students will receive individual tutoring at the synagogue with a Sinai-employed tutor in weekly, half-hour sessions.

This new program represents the hard work of a number of Sinai staff, lay leaders, and volunteers. We look forward to continuing to provide meaningful Jewish experiences for all of our members.


Join us to observe Tisha b'Av with an evening service of communal mourning including the chanting of Eicha (Book of Lamentations) and Kinot poems.


